INTRODUCTION

This Congregational theological college was founded in 1901 as a successor to Western College, Plymouth (established 1845), which was itself the successor of Western Academies at Exeter (1829-45), Axminster (1795-1828), Taunton (1780-94), Bridport (1765-79) and Ottery St. Mary (1752-64). Western College, Bristol was closed and its work absorbed into that of the Congregational College, Manchester in 1969, when the MSS. described in the following list were transferred to New College, London.

[Lavington would presumably be Rev. Jn. Lavington, jun., <u>DNB</u>, (d.1764), principal tutor at the Western Academy fd. by his father at Ottery St. Mary, Devon in 1752. Rev. Sam. Rooker, ordained in 1799, was minister at Bideford. Rev. Thos. Reader, minister of St. Paul's Meeting, Taunton, d.1794. The copying is dated from Rooker's inscriptions on the page foll. the flyleaf in each vol. & from his note at the conclusion of the work. These 3 vols. orig. formed part of a sequence of 5. They contain Lectures 23-40; 59-76; 77-96.]

Rev. H. Mends, Plymouth: MS. vol. of Sermons W. notes as to when & where preached. Incl.: sermon preached at Totnes on opening of a new place of worship, 11 Aug 1793; at Kingsbridge on ordination of Rev. Sam. Blatchford, 4 Nov 1789 and at Launceston on ordination of Rev. Jonas Lewis, 12 Oct 1796; "Introductory Discourse" at Assembly of Calvinistic Ministers of Devon & Cornwall, Charmouth, 16 Sept 1789 [in order in which they appear in the volume].

MS. notes in front of vol. by W. F. Windeatt: sermons of Rev. Herbert Mends of Plymouth given to Rev. Thos. White Windeatt of Totnes by Mends' widow, shortly after his death.

Wes. Coll. bookplate: presented by J. Windcatt, Plymouth, Oct 1879.
