The pope then issued an edict to the bishop of Hereford that he should accept the Dominican Friars with kindness and bid the canons not The to interfere further with the Friars. bishop however did not obey this edict, and the canons entered the house of the Friars. excommunicated them. and destroyed their house causing a considerable amount of damage and loss. The pope therefore sends a commission to the [archdeacon and official of Worcester and the] treasurer of Lichfield to inquire into the dispute and to try to bring about an amicable settlement. MEMORANDUM of Peter, bishop of Hereford, as papal delegate together with the archbishop of York, concerning a marriage-contract between Henry [III], King of England, and domina Johanna, daughter of the Count of Ponthieu, and Queen of Castile, concerning the consent given on both sides, and concerning the fourth degree of kinship which existed between them. The two parties were summoned to appear in the octaves of the Feast of Saint Gregory in the year 1251 in the church of Saint Stephen Senon', the Archbishop of York excusing himself by letter. The said lady did not appear, but magister John, proctor of the King of England, appeared before the bishop at the stated time and place. The bishop was assisted in the tribunal by dominus G., bishop of Auxerre, and by John, subcantor, and John, canon and official of Auxerre.

The King's proctor delivered to the tribunal a statement, dated in the octaves of the Feast of Saint Gregory, recalling the proposal for marriage between the two parties. Then the King of England discovered that they were related in the fourth degree; he therefore abandoned the project, and took as his Queen domina Helienora, daughter of the Duke of Provence. Domina Johanna contracted marriage with the King of Castile. The King's proctor therefore demanded that, in order to remove all suspicions or objections, the tribunal should examine witnesses to prove the said kinship in the fourth degree, especially in view of the contumacy of the Queen of Castile who had refused to obey the summons to appear at the tribunal, delivered to her by the Prior of Alta Comba of the Cistercian Order. The tribunal accepted the witnesses and examined them closely, and on the Wednesday before Palm Sunday, proclaimed that no marriage-contract ever existed between King Henry [III] of England and Johanna, Queen of Castile, by reason of their kinship in the fourth degree which had been established. Therefore the marriage of the said King Henry with domina Helienora was legitimate and in accordance with the canons of the church.

Walter de Munemut'; the keeping by the dean and chapter of the churches of Wolvinehope, Pionia, Prestona, Norton', Maurdene, Wihintone, Brahintone, and Upton, and the institution and pensions of the vicars therein; the bishop's right of correction and visitation in these churches; the receiving by the dean and chapter of forty shillings [annually] from the hospital of Ledebur'; the administration of the almshouse in the city of Hereford founded by Elias de Bristollis for the sustenance of one hundred paupers each day; the receiving by the dean and chapter of fourteen and a half marks from the church of Dudelebur! to the injury of the rector thereof; the receiving by three chaplains of the blessed Catherine, by the authority of the dean and chapter, of pensions in the churches of Foye, Boclenton', and Presthemede; the custody of the tithes of his mills and of the fair of Saint Ethelbert; the appointment of a steward to supervise the affairs of the church [of Hereford]; the receiving by the dean and chapter of the obventions of the mill of Hyan'; the custody of thirty-two thraves of winter crop and thirty-two thraves of cats from the bishop's manors annually; the bishop's right of correction and visitation in the deanery of Hereford; the keeping by the dean of Hereford of the vill of Hunditon' and the prebend of Hunditon'; the keeping by the same of the churches of Clon' and Avenebur'; the right of institution of the prior of Saint Guthlac of Hereford, and of other rectors and vicars in the deanery of Hereford; the custody of a third part of the tithes from the episcopal manors.

The dispute was referred by the aforementioned judges to the papal see, and Richard, deacon of Saint Angelo, cardinal, was appointed by the Pope to be auditor of the dispute. The proctors of the two parties and the dean of Hereford in person appeared before the said Richard, and agreed upon the said Richard, the archdeacon of Canterbury, and <u>magister</u> Hugh de Mortuomari as arbitrators of the dispute.

The said arbitrators decided as follows:- the dean and chapter were to hand the church of Baysam to the bishop, and to pay to the bishop one hundred marks; the bishop was advised to restore the said church to the dean and chapter as Ralph, formerly bishop of Hereford, granted it to them. For the other points, the bishop was to accept and preserve the conditions then existing, except that in the churches held by the dean and chapter, vicars were to be instituted and sufficient pensions assigned to them. Concerning the almshouse of Hereford, paupers were to be supported there according as the resources of the almshouse permitted. The bishop was to pay to the dean and chapter, as before, the tithes of the mills, the fair and assarts, the thraves of wheat and oats, and the five loads of corn. Moreover the bishop was to pay to the dean and chapter the said tithes which he and his predecessors had been accustomed to pay to them; and he was to revoke an order made by him to the abbot of Gloucester, the abbot of Gingemut', the parson of Boclenton', and the vicar of Dudelebur', that they

should cease to pay their due portions to certain vicars in the greater church of Hereford and in the chapel of Saint Catherine. Given at Perugia. PAPAL. BULL of Urban [IV] directed to the bishop and archdeacon of Llandaff, concerning the intrusion of the Dominican Friars into the city of Hereford. The Dominican Friars, though they had no licence from the bishop of Hereford had begun to erect a church and buildings for their habitation. They desisted at the protest of the dean and chapter, some of whom later impeded the Friars in their building, and suffered the sentence of excommunication. The archdeacon and official of Worcester and the treasurer of Lichfield were asked to carry out an inquiry for an amicable settlement, or to transmit the matter to the Pope. In this however, the dean and chapter felt that they had suffered an injustice, and the suit returned to the Pope who appointed R. cardinal, deacon of Saint Angelo, to hear the suit. The latter condemned the previous hearing of the suit, and held that the pleadings of the dean and chapter of Hereford must be considered. The suit was then assigned to J. a cardinal priest, of the title of Saint Laurence in Lucin', and at last the Pope issued a mandate that the Dominican Friars should desist from their building. Then the proctors of both sides appearing before the said J., cardinal, agreed to leave the matter in suspense for

a certain length of time in the hope of a peaceful settlement between the parties. At the end of this fixed period, the case was examined fully before frater Rustandus, chaplain of the Pope, and certain judges, and at last Pope Alexander issued a mandate which made no mention of his previous edict, but forbade the dean and chapter from interfering with the building work of the Dominican Friers. This mandate was communicated to them by the bishop of Worcester, but its justice was disputed by the dean and chapter since the appeal which had been made by them had not then been considered; they therefore appealed again to the Fope. The latter [Urban IV] hereby appoints the bishop and the archdeacon of Llandaff to inquire into the case, and to reach a just decision on the disputed points. Given at Viterbo.
