## NOTE ON ACCESS

Access for *bona fide* researchers to papers held at 15 Woburn Square will be allowed to papers more than 30 years old, subject to permission being granted by the Editorial Board of the Trust, or by the Director acting on their behalf. #### INTRODUCTION

The History of Parliament is a major academic project to create a scholarly reference work to describe the members, constituencies and activities of the Parliament of England and the United Kingdom.

The History of Parliament was originally conceived by Josiah Clement Wedgwood (1872-1943), 1<sup>st</sup> Baron Wedgwood, MP for Newcastle-under-Lyme in Staffordshire from 1906. From 1928 he tried to persuade the government to fund a national dictionary of parliamentary biography, to record and identify the 75,000 members who had sat in every Parliament to 1918. A Committee on the records of the House of Commons was set up in 1929 and reported in 1932, but no funding was forthcoming from the government. However Wedgwood started the project himself and produced two volumes in 1936 and 1938, supported by a Committee on the history of Parliament.

In 1940 the History of Parliament Trust was founded to take the work forward on a more professional footing. However it was not until 1951 that the Treasury finally agreed to fund the project. An Editorial Board was established, a general editor and staff were taken on and eminent historians were invited to edit a number of sections. Sir Lewis Namier sat on the Board and acted as senior editor from 1951. A friend of Wedgwood, he had been associated with the project from the start in 1929. The project was initially based at the Institute of Historical Research in the University of London, before moving to its present location in Woburn Square.

Since 1993, the History of Parliament has been principally funded by an annual grantin-aid from the House of Commons. From 1998, the House of Lords has contributed a fifth of this annual amount because of the opening of a Section on the history of the House of Lords (1660-1832).

The records described in this report consist principally of the administrative records and working papers of the project since 1951. In addition to correspondence of the Secretary to the Editorial Board (latterly the Director) with Trustees, Board members, section editors, custodians of records and publishers, there is a large accumulation of research papers for volumes in the published series, including indexes, transcripts of original documents and photocopies. Accounts and other administrative records are also present, but the minutes of the Editorial Board were not inspected. The papers seen include a substantial quantity of Sir Lewis Namier's correspondence connected with the *History*, mainly 1952-9.

The other major group of records in the custody of the Trust is the Wedgwood papers c1929-41. These relate almost entirely to Colonel Wedgwood's work on the *History*, and include correspondence and papers of the 1929-32 Committee as well as his own correspondence and working papers for the 1930s. Among the former are returns to a questionnaire to custodians of municipal and other records, and among the latter are returns to a biographical questionnaire sent to fellow MPs in 1937. Also with these papers are notebooks, etc of the Revd AB Beaven (d1924). A volume of original eighteenth-century papers relating to Newcastle-under-Lyme may also have been acquired by Wedgwood. His papers appear to have come to the Trust c1951, probably from a family source. Other personal and family papers were deposited in Keele University Library (see NRA 28564; information from Keele website).

The records are stored in the History of Parliament building in Woburn Square. They were inspected on 11 November 2002, and the Commission is grateful to the Director for this opportunity to record their existence and scope.

The report does not cover the records of the Trust of the History of Parliament, which are held by the House of Lords Record Office, and which were not inspected.
